

Dana Campbell is an attorney for the Criminal Justice Program of the Animal Legal Defense Fund (ALDF), a national non-profit organization comprised of attorneys dedicated to enforcing and enhancing laws affecting the welfare of animals. She is also an adjunct professor of Animal Law at Cornell Law School in Ithaca New York. Previously, she taught Animal Law as an adjunct professor at Lewis and Clark Law School in Portland Oregon, and Vermont Law School.

In addition, she has presented over 50 lectures on assorted Animal Law topics across the US and Canada, including the Manhattan NY District Attorney's Office; numerous law schools and humane societies; the Washington, Oregon, and New York State Bar Associations; and the National Animal Control Officer's Association. Ms. Campbell has advised the Delaware and New Jersey Governors' Task Forces on Animal Welfare, as well as the Oregon Zoo. She is the author of the *Legal Advocates' Manual for Animal Abuse Criminal Cases*, and has been the source for innumerable television, radio, and print media interviews.

Prior to her animal law career, Ms. Campbell was a deputy district attorney both in Oregon and in Maui, Hawaii, and successfully tried hundreds of criminal cases in court, specializing in animal cruelty and neglect, domestic violence, and child sex-assault cases. She was a founding member of the Maui County Hawaii Domestic Violence Task Force, has received training on witness interview techniques from the FBI, and taught police officer refresher courses in evidence collection and courtroom techniques.

Ms. Campbell earned her B.S. degree at Oregon State University, and her J.D. at Lewis and Clark Law School. She is licensed to practice law in New York, Oregon, Hawaii, and Washington state.

She shares her home with her family and 2 rescued dogs.
