



#### PLENARY: Ethics: Strengthening the Profession Against Illegality and Interference with Lawyer Independence (2.0 ethics credits)

Lawyers have increasingly come under the magnifying glass in the Americas. Multinational transactions, foreign investor disputes, and an unprecedented wave of cases of official corruption and resulting compliance matters, bring a focus upon the important role of lawyers in serving and promoting the rule of law. At the same time, the independence of lawyers – the ability to advise and represent clients free from interference by forces outside the lawyer-client relationship – has come under attack.
