Violence Within and Without of Schools: Protecting and Educating Our Children (K-12) in 2016

This program will provide insight and understanding of the legal challenges confronting school districts related to school violence. An overview of the history of relevant laws, regulation and state and federal guidance related to safety and violence and prevention for students and staff will be offered highlighting state and federal responses over time. Recent case developments relating to school violence and liability will be addressed from topics ranging from bullying, internet and off-campus threats, peer on peer assault and staff safety issues will be covered. The final portion of the program focus on where do we go from here. Presenters will discuss different state and local strategies and programs which are geared to respond to the challenges of school violence and to highlight what preventive and supportive measures in NY and across the nation which are in development to address this national crisis.
